PRE-ENTRY FOR NEW/RENEWAL STUDENT



WHAT IS A STUDENT PASS?

- A student pass is a pass that is required for all new or returning students to obtain in order to stay in Malaysia legally.
- The student pass validity ranges from 12 months to 36 months (for new students who come
 with eVAL), and 12 months for returning students according to the Immigration Department
 of Malaysia guidelines.
- New students must fill in the eVAL application from outside of Malaysia and obtain Single Entry Visa from the Malaysia Embassy in the respective area. Other than that, the students can also apply for eVISA from the Immigration Department's website in order to travel to Malaysia.

SINGLE ENTRY VISA/EVISA

- The Single-Entry Visa is an approval given by the Malaysian Embassy to future students to gain entry to Malaysia. The Single-Entry Visa will take 14 working days to be completed.
- e- VISA is a substitute for the Single-Entry Visa. The students can apply directly from the Immigration Department's website, and it will take 2-5 working days to be completed. But the e-VISA is not applicable for all countries.

HOW TO OBTAIN A STUDENT PASS?

- For new students, they need to do the medical check-up at the University Health Centre and apply for insurance (if they did not buy it together with the EMGS application). After the process is done, the student needs to submit the passport physically to the International Office's counter and wait for a minimum of 14 working days for the student pass to be completed.
- For returning students, they need to start the process a minimum of 60 days before the student pass expires. There is a checklist of documents that they need to prepare in order to obtain the student pass from the Immigration Department of Malaysia.

PRE-ENTRY FOR NEW/RETURNING DEPENDANT



WHAT IS A DEPENDANT PASS?

- · A Dependant pass is a pass that is given to the dependant of a student who is studying in Malaysia in order to stay legally in Malaysia.
- · The dependant pass will depend on the principal (student) pass availability.
- New dependants must apply for a social pass in order to gain entry to Malaysia depending on the Malaysian embassy at the respective area.


SINGLE ENTRY VISA

• The Single Entry Visa is an approval given by the Malaysian Embassy for future dependants to gain entry to Malaysia. The Single Entry Visa will take 14 working days to be completed.

HOW TO OBTAIN A DEPENDANT PASS?

- For new dependants, it is advisable for the principal (student) to get the student pass first, and then the principal is required to submit the application for new dependant. After the Immigration Department asks for the passport to be submitted, then only the dependant is allowed to enter Malaysia.
- For returning dependants, they need to start the process of renewal after the principal (student) has completed the renewal student pass. There is a checklist of documents that they need to prepare in order to obtain the dependant pass from the Immigration Department of Malaysia.

Happening today is The Virtual Mobility Education Fair (VMEF) 2022, organised by Education Malaysia Australia, EMGS, and powered by the Ministry of Higher Education. Through this event, 23 top Malaysian universities were featured in and promoted mobility programmes at their respective university.

The first destination of the tour was the Mah Meri Cultural Village. Native to the Peninsular, Mah Meri is one of the ethnic groups in Malaysia, well-known for their unique wood carving. The students were given the opportunity to learn leaf origami and traditional dances. The trip to Mah Meri Cultural Village concluded around noon. Afterwards, the students were taken for a short lunch before departing to their next destination, the National Museum.

At the National Museum, the students were able to visit the available galleries to gain more insight into the history of Malaysia as the gallery exhibition covers the prehistoric era, Malay kingdoms in the Malay Archipelago, and the colonial era in Malaysia to modern-day Malaysia.

The day trip ended with dinner at the Sri Nirwana Maju Restaurant in Bangsar, Kuala Lumpur. The students tried Banana leaf rice, a traditional Indian cuisine for their dinner. The trip ended around 6.30 p.m. and the first physical trip since the endemic phase in Malaysia was announced was deemed a success. With the success of the first PET program, i-PUTRA is looking into establishing more programs for their inbound mobility students to bring them closer to the communities around them.



INBOUND STAFF MOBILITY (ISM) 2022 AT INSTITUT TEKNOLOGI SEPULUH NOPEMBER

As part of the effort in the Enrichment of Human Capital, two i-PUTRA staff, Miss Siti Hajar Najiyah Mohd Pauzi from the Mobility Section and Miss Junainah Husin from the Administration and Support Service Section were selected to pursue their outbound staff mobility through the Inbound Staff Mobility (ISM) at Institute Teknologi Sepuluh Nopember (ITS), Surabaya, Indonesia. The program was held from 06th June 2022 until 11th June 2022 and was joined by staff of 10 universities from different countries such as Thailand, Philippines, Poland, Turkiye, and Malaysia. The delegation from Thailand was made up of staff from 4 different universities; Mahidol University, Mae Fah Luang University (MFU), King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok (KMUTNB) and King Mongkut's Institute of Technology Ladkrabang (KMITL). Representing the Philippines were the delegation from the University of St. La Salle (USLS) Bacolod and Agusan Del Sur State College of Agriculture & Technology (ASSCAT). There were also participants from the Poland University of Szczecin and the University of Applied Sciences in Nysa. Istanbul Aydin University (IAU), Turkiye also participated in this ISM programme. Besides UPM, another delegation from Malaysia was the representative from University Malaysia Perlis (UNIMAP).

The one-week programme was curated and led by the Global Engagement Office ITS. Through this session, we were also able to meet one of UPM's long-time partners which is Universitas Riau and other new universities in Surabaya to discuss prospective collaboration .

Besides the engagement session, ITS has also organised the "Let's Study Abroad" program, which is an initiative by the ITS Global Engagement Office to encourage their students to pursue their mobility program abroad. Through this program, participants from the ISM 2022 were given the opportunity to promote their program which includes postgraduate studies and mobility opportunities for ITS' students.
